Thursday, 31st.—Katie and I went into town and had a delightful skate. Mr. Haycock had had a pole put up in the Rink, from which depended a number of ribbons. The dancers stood round it, and each one held a ribbon in her hand; then we went round and round to music, as in the best figure of the lancers, the ribbons being lifted over and under, so that gradually they got plaited round the pole. Then we stopped, turned round, and going in the opposite direction unplaited them again.

A great number of skaters had collected, and we had a very amusing morning-party.
